UNFICYP swimming meet at Nicosia

This Friday will see five UNFICYP Contingents competing in a swimming meeting. The meet, the first of its kind to be held on the Island will take place at the Ledra Palace Hotel Swimming Pool, Nicosia.

Members of the British, Canadian, Danish, Finnish and Swedish Contingen's will participate in the swimming events and also in a mini-golf competition.

A large audience is expected at the meet, which starts at 1400 hrs. Admission to the pool is free.

Security Council hears accusations by Turkey and Cyprus of creating tension

THE U.N. Security Council last week heard Turkey and Cyprus accuse each other of creating new tension in the area in disregard of the Council's earlier calls for restraint on the part of all concerned.

Turkey charged in particular that Greek Cypriots had created a grave situation by changing the electoral law of Cyprus so as to eliminate provisions for separate voting majorities for Turkish Cypriot and Greek Cypriot communities.

This, said Ambassador Orhan Eralp of Turkey, was the latest in a series of steps taken to usurp the power vested in the Turkish Cypriot community by the constitution. The purpose, he said, was to destroy the communal partnership on which the independence of the Island was based and impose union of Cyprus with Greece against the will of the Turkish Cypriots, who make up 20 per cent the country's population.

Mr. Eralp said his country was bound to protect the rights of the



Turkish Cypriot community under the Treaty of Guanantee which formed part of the arrangements for Cyprus' independence in 1960. Under the Treaty, Britain,

orhan in 1960. Under Eralp the Treaty, Britain, Greece and Turkey guaranteed Cyprus' indepence, territorial integrity, and basic constitutional provisions.

Foreign Minister Spyros Kyprianou of Cyprus counter-charged that Turkey was invoking the Treaty as a pretext for naked threats of aggression just as she had used it last year as a pretext for bombing innocent civilians in Cyprus. This, he said, was in line with the wild dream of partitioning the Island.

Mr. Kuprianou argued that the Treaty of Guarantee was invalid because it had been imposed on Cyprus against the will of the people. And even if there were any doubts on this score, he said, not even the slightest doubt about the invalidity of the Treaty should remain after last year's Turkish bombings.

Mr. Kyprianou said the situation in Cyprus had been radically altered since December 1963 as a result of the Turkish Cypriot rebellion, Turkish aggression and other developments. And it was inconceivable, he declared that Cyprus should return to the divisive provisions of a constitution which had led to the crises in the country. Mr. Kyprianou said that the electoral legislation in question related solely to the normal functioning of the country and was a matter exclusively within the domestic jurisdiction of the Cyprus Government in which Turkey had no right to intervene.

Ambassador Alexis Liatis of Greete said that without questioning the authority of the Cyprus Government one might still wish for avoidance of anything that might lead to any untoward reaction, but there was absolutely no justification for Turkey's complaint to the Council.

Mr. Liatis said that Turkey herself was responsible for tension in Cyprus, as she wished to see the resurrection of a form of government which had proved to be totally unworkable and which lay at the root of all the Island's difficulties. Under the 1960 Constitution, he said, it was possible for less than five per cent of the population to block the will of the other 95 per cent.

Britain, the United States, France and the Soviet Union all called for restraint on the part of all conncerned.

Sir Roger Jackling of the United Kingdom particularly urged the Cyprus Government not to gi-





The cheques represented payments by these Governments of the pledges of voluntary contributions they had made on 21 June to help the United Nations out of its present financial difficulties.

On Mukavampi Kavella itse Koneeseen

Tiistaina 3.8 klo 0715B paikallista aikaa lähti Suomeen lentokone, jonka mukana seurasi eräs tiedustelujoukkueejaäkåri joka päinvastoin kuin muut kotimaahan matkaajat oli kannettiava koneeseen paareilla. Sillä hän oli loukannut itsensä auto-onnettomuudessa 13.7 klo 1220B ja vain onni ja lääkäritaito olivat pelastaneet hänet elävien kirjoihin; jalka murtunut useasta kohden, oikea peukalo poikki, alaleuka murtunut, kaikki hampaat pudonneet jne. - Ja kuitenkin tämä ja useimmat muut auto-onnettomuudet olisivat olleet vältettävissä, mikäli annettuja ohjeita ja nopeusrajoituksia olisi noudatettu.

SHOMALAISTEN LIIKENNE-**KURJUUS PAHIN**

Turvajoukkojen v.t. sotapoliisipäullikkölta, suomalaiselta majuri K Maurialta saamiemme tilastotietojen mukaan nayttavat juuri yksplaiset olevan kehittymattomimpia liikennekultuurin suhteen. Tilastojen mukaan näyttävat nimittäin suomalaiset tuloksellaan 49 olevan toiseksi huonoimpia englantilaisten 64 jälkeen sillä kanadalaisilla on yhteensa 47, tanskalaisilla ja irlantilaisilla 39 ja ruotaalaisilla ainoastaan 30 auto-onnettomuutta v. 1965. Mikäli suhdeluku lasketaan ajoneuvolukumäärän tai ajettujen kilometrien määrän mukaan joutuvat meikäläiset aivan surulliseen asemaan. Alkanut elokuu kolmine onnettomuuksineen on osoittamassa hehitysta pahempaan suuntaan

Mainittakoon saman tien, että menneen kuudentoista kuukauden aikana YK-aioneuvot ovat olleet mukana 573:ssa liikenneonnettomuudessa, joissa on aiheutettu 15 kuolemantapausta ja 197 lievää tai vaikeaa vahingoittumista. Edellä esitettyjen lukujen valossa meidän suomalaisten osalle on langennut suhteellista osuutta huomattavasti suurempi rikkomusmäärä. - Ja kuitenkin melkein kaikki olisi ollut valtettävissä yksinkertaisesti vain noudattamalla annettuja nopeusrajoituksia ja liikennemaarayksia.





ve effect to the recent electoral legislation. He noted that the legislation was passed by the House of Representatives in the absence of the Turkish Cypriot members and noted Britain's special concern as a party to the Treaty of Guarantee.

Sir Roger said that the Treaty was part and parcel of the series of agreements upon which the independence of Cyprus depended. All these treaties and the Constitution of Cyprus itself were freely negotiated he said, and could not be unilaterally abroga-

Ambassador Charles Yost of the United States also spoke out against any unilateral abrogation of treaties and said that the legislative action taken by the Cyprus Government could hardly be regarded as in line with the Council's earlier calls for restraint.

Ambassador Jacques Tine of France said it was undeniable that the decisions taken by the Cyprus Government might compromise attempts at finding a peaceful solution to the Cyprus problem.

Ambassador Platon Morozov of the Soviet Union said that the withdrawal of all foreign troops and the liquidation of all foreign bases in Cyprus was an essential prerequisite for ensuring that the people of Cyprus could freely regulate their own domestic affairs.

At the request of Ambassador Eralp of Turkey, the Council agreed to hear, as an individual, Mr. Rauf Denktash, whom Mr. Eralp identified as President of Turkish Communal Chamber of the Cyprus.

Mr. Denktash said the Council should condemn the latest action by the Greek Cypriots as being designed to rob the Turkish Cypriot community of all its constitutional rights. His people, he said would never submit to the un constitutional dictatorship of Archbishop Makarios and would take whatever steps were necessary to protect their rights.

World population expected to be over 6,000 million by turn of century

TRACING the history of man on the planet earth has always been an inexact science, but most exper's agree that he was a relatively rare creature some half million years ago, moving up from tens of hundreds of thousands to perhaps 200-300 million at the beginning of the Christian era. It then took, according to the generally accepted assumption, another 1,700 years for that figure approximately to double to 500 million. The 1,000 million mark was reached some wo centuries later — by 1850 — and in the succeeding 110 years, the population reached the 3,000 million mark.

Thus, ages passed before the 250 million mark was reached two thousand years ago, and sixteen centuries more before the population reached 500 million. Then, it suddenly doubled in two and one half centuries and again in less than one century.

Now, world population is increasing at a rate (1.9 per cent annually) that will double the number in about 40 years. According to "plausible longrange" projections made recently by the United Nations in connection with the forth-coming U.N. World Population Conference which will be held in Belgrade between 30 August and 10 September, world population — approximately 3,000 million in 1960 will rise to the order of 5,300 - 6,800 million by the year 2000. A figure near 6,000 million seems a comparatively likely expectation, according according to the projections.

However, the world total by the year 2,000 could rise to the level of 2.5 times the 1960 figure — to 7,410 million — if the 1960 fertility rate were to continue and if mortali'y were to go on decreasing at the pace which prevailed during the 1950's, an assumption which U.N. demographers consider unlikely

While calculations based on these assumptions show an increase in world population of 2.5 times the 1960 figure, the population of Latin America by the end of the century would be 3.6 times as large; Africa and South Asia would each have more than three times as many inhabitants; East Asia 2.3 times as many; Oceania, North America and the Soviet Union would nearly double; and Europe's population would be increased by

Somewhat smaller population increases than the above assumptions should be expected, according to the U.N. re-

Using the 5,300 - 6,800 million range for the year 2000 as the most l'kely expectation, in the four major areas of the world that are now developed, be ween 30 and 60 per cent would be added to the 1960 porulation by the year 2000, the most likely increase being about 50 per cent. In the areas now less developed, the population would increase between

65 and 150 per cent, the most likely increase being estimated at about 120 per cent.

More than 480 papers prepared by specialists in 60 countries or territories and seven international organizations have been submitted for use as a basis for discussions at the U.N. World Populat.on Conference in Belgrade.

The papers deal with questios to be discussed at 23 meetings of the Conference including, for example:

Future population trends and prospects;

• Fertility and a number of specific related aspects, such

as family planning;

Mortality and particular problems such as infant mortality:

Migration from rural areas to cities in developing countries, and international shifting of population;

• Relation between population and specific economic and soproblems, such as food supply, manpower, natural resources, education, housing, industry and economic growth.

Racial Problems:-

Call for urgent Security Council meetings

Thirty-two African States last week called for urgent meetings of the U.N. Security Council to deal with the situation arising from Souh Africa's continuing racial (apartheid) policies and to consider once again the si-tuation in African territories under Portuguese rule.

In separate letters request-ing the meetings, the African States described both situations as posing serious threats to world peace and secu-

The letter on the issue of apartheid called for decisive action by the Council to get South Africa to comply with past U.N. resolutions calling for a change in her racial policies. In particular, it noted that South Africa's refusal to heed the Council's call for end to arbitrary trials of oponents of apartheid and her rejection of the recommendation by a special United Nations committee that all people of South Africa be consulted as to the future of country.

In asking the Council to consider the situation in the African territories under Portuguese rule, the 32 States said that repressive measures and military operations against the peoples of the territories had been intensified, and that Portugal had violated the territory of adjacent African States.

Economic and Social Council

Serious consideration of Decade progress

THE United Nations Economic and Social Council, which ended its summer session in Geneva last week, gave serious consideration to progress made during the first half of the U.N. Development Decade.

The Council members all noted that development efforts had been made difficult by the inability of the world's food supply to keep pace food supply to keep pace with the ever-increasing population.

To cope with the problems, the Council adopted resolutions calling for a long-range work programme in the field of population and recom-mended the continuation of the Joint United Nations/FAO World Food Programme for as long as multilateral food aid is found feasible desirable. It also set up a target of \$275 million for voluntary contributions to the food programme over the next three years.

The widening gap between

rich and poor nations was also stressed again and again by speakers in discussing the world economic situa-

Among other actions taken by the Council was a call for a world land reform conference to be held next year; a comprehensive review and evaluation of the technical aid operations of the United Nations and its Nations and its specialized agencies, including those of the U.N. Special Fund; and a decision to convene an international conference on human rights during 1968, which has been designated as International Year for Human Rights.
