UN Security Council Debates Question of Dominican Republic

The U.N. Security Council last week twice postponed a vote on the Soviet draft resolution condemning U.S. intervention in the Dominican Republic and asking for the immediate withdrawal of United States forces.

The Council first decided to postpone its vote on Thursday, 6 May, and again on Friday, 7 May, the first time at the request of Uruguay and the second time at the request of Uruguay and Jordan. The Council was scheduled to meet again yesterday Tuesday, 11

Danish Rotation Begins

The Secretary of State for External Affairs of Canada, the Honourable Paul Martin, visited Cyprus last week to see the Canadian Contingent with the United Nations Force and to call on President Makarios, Vice President F. Kuchuk, and the Special Representative of the United Nations Secretary-General in Cyprus Mr. Carlos A. Bernardes.

Limnitis Traffic Now Unrestricted

On Monday, 10 May, a spokesman for the United declared that as a result of arrangements made by the local UNFICYP Commander in Morphou District, civilian traffic along the Limnitis road will be unrestricted between the hours of 0500 and 1900 daily with effect from

that date.

One UNFICYP escorted convoy will travel from West to East at 1900 hours and one UNFICYP escorted convoy from East to West at 2000 hours daily also with effect from 10 May 1965.

Mr. Martin arrivad in Cyprus on board a YUKON aircraft of the Royal Canadian Air Force on 3 May and departed two days later. He was accompanied during his visit here by Mr. Marcel Cadieux, Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs; Mr. H.B.O. Robinson, Assistant Under-Secretary of State for Exter-nal Affairs; Mr. Ross Cambell, Canadian Ambassador to yugoslavia; Mr. Arthur R. Menzies, Head of the Defence Liaison "I" Division of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs; Mr. James George, Head of the Ministry's European Division; and Mr. d' Iberville Fortier, head of the Press Licison Division of the Depart

While in Nicosia, Mr. Martin and his party visited UNFICYP Headquarters, where he met with Mr. Bernardes, the Officiating Commander, Brig. Bruce Macdonald, and other high ranking UNFICYP Officers, the Troodos Base Camp, Nicosia Zone Headquarters, the Nicosia Zone Headquarters, the Headquarters of the 1st Battation of the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada and different posts of the Canadian Contingent in the Kyrenia hills.

Speaking to representatives of the press at the Nicosia airport before his departure, Mr. Martin said he had been particularly happy to meet the President, Archbishop Makarios, and Vice President Kuchuk.

He had come to Cyprus to see the Canadian contingent, he said, and to pay his respects to the United Nations Force. Mr. Martin said he had taken advantage of the occasion to exchange views on the United Nations oper-

Tiedotusasiat ja niiden hoito muodostaa nykyään varsin elimillisen osan minkä tahansa inhimillisen yhteisön toiminnassa. Tämän vuoksi niiden oikea, asiallinen ja onnistunut hoito on erittäin tärkeää nimenomaan vaikeaa kansainvälistä tehtävää suorittavalle joukko-osoastolle kuten YKSP 3:lle. Koska meille suomalaisille tähän alaan kuuluvat asiat lienevät uusia eikä meillä monestikaan ole paljoa kokemuksia näiden asioiden hoidosta lienee syytä paneutua lyhyesti aiheeseen myös tämän lehden palstoilla.

Tehtavista HQ UNFICYP tasolla

Todettakoon alkajaisiksi, että YK:n turvajoukkojen toiminta Kyproksella edellyttää nopeaa ja asiallista tiedotuspalvelua niin kansainvälisen, paikallisen kuin joukkoja lähettaneitten valtioitten kotimaan joukkotiedotusvalineitten tarpeita, varten. Tätä silmälläpitäen on turvajoukkojen esikuntaan, operatiivisen toimiston yhteyteen, komentajan ja poliittisen sihteeriston alaisuuteen, perustettu erillinen tiedotustoimisto (PIO, Public Information Office), jonka ensisijaisena tehtävänä on olla vastuussa kaikesta Yhdistyneitä Kansakuntia ja sen Kyproksella toimivia turvajoukkoja koskevasta tiedotustoiminnasta.

Tiedotustoimisto on siis ainoa virallinen läbde turvajoukkoja koskevissa sot. ja siv poliittisissa tiedotusasioissa. Tassa ominaisuudessa se järjestää lehdistötilaisuuksia, antaa lausuntoja, ilmoituksia ja toimittaa kuva-, filmi ja äänitysmateriaalia joukkotiedotusvälineitten edustajille. Se pitää yhteyttä riiriitaosapuolien tiedotusviranomaisiin ja järjestää lehdistön edustajille asiaankuuluvat kulku- ja liikkumisluvat vierailuja varten eri joukkoosastoissa. Sen tehtävana on my6s pitää luetteloa lehdistön edustajista ja vastata turvajoukkojen yhteisjulkaisun 'Blue Beretin' toimittamisesta ja jakelusta.

Toimintaa varten tiedotustoimisto on jaettu kahteen osaan a) poliittiseen ja b) sotilastiedotusjaostoon.

a.) Poliittisella puolella on vastaavana turvajoukkojen tiedotuspäällikkö (PIO; Principal Information Officer), joka samalla toimii koko toimiston päällikköna. Hänen tehtävänään on olla ensisijaisessa vastuussa siitä, että tiedotustoiminta kauttaaltaan vastaa Yhdistyneitten Kansakuntien sille asettamia poliittisia muotoja. Toiminta on erittäin herkkää ulkopuoliselle arvostelulle, minka vuoksi se vaatii toteuttajaltaan erittäin suurta taitoa ja kokemusta. Tässä mielessa tiedotuspäällikkö on jatkuvassa, yhteydessa YK:n New Yorkin päämajaan, Geneven toimistooh, paasihteerin Kyproksella toimivaan erikoisvaltuutettuun, turvajoukkojen komentajaan ja poliittiseen sihteeristöön. Hänen apunaan siviilitiedotusjaostossa toimii kaksi YK: n päämajan lähettämää lehdistosihteeria.

b.) Sotilastiedotusjaoston päällikköna toimii everstiluutnantin arvoinen sotilastiedotuspäällikkö (M. P.I.O.; Military Public Information Officer), joka turvajoukkojen komentajan alaisena ja kiinteässa yhyhteistoiminnassa operatiivisen toimiston kanssa vastaa siitä, että tiedotusasiat tulevat hoidetuiksi nimenomaan operatiiviset ja sotilaspoliittiset näkökohdat huomioonottaen. Hän huolehtii myös siitä, supseerin vastuulla. Toiminta on

että sotilasjaoston tai joukko-osastojen tiedotushenkilöstön kautta joukkotiedotusvälineitten edustajat eivät saa tietoonsa mitään sotilastai poliittisluontoista aineistoa ilman, että tiedotustoimisto olisi asiasta tietoinen tai antanut siihen

Sotilastiedotuspäällikön suoranaisina alaisina toimistossa toimii kolme lehdistöupseeria (AMPIO; Assistant Military Public Information Officer), jotka vakanssit turvajoukkojen esikunnan tämänhetkisen organisation mukaan on annettu englantilaisen, irlantilaisen ja suomalaisen tiedotusupseerin hoidettaviksi. Toimiston henkilokuntaan kuuluu lisaksi pari aukirjuria, valokuvaajaífilmaaja ja autonkuljettajia.

Tehtävistä joukko-osastotasolla

Tiedotusasioitten tehokas hoito edellyttaa kuitenkin huomattavaa toiminnallista panosta kunkin kansallisen joukko-osaston taholta. Tässä mielessa jokaisen kontingentin esikuntaan on perustettu erillinen tiedotusupseerin (PRO; Public Relations Officer) virka.

Turvajoukkojen ns. pysyväismä-

ärävsten antamien ohieitten mukaan tiedotusupseeri, joka toimii kontingentin komentajan ja lehdistoupseerin alaisena, on ensisijaisessa vastuussa siitä, että turvaioukkojen tjedotustojmisto on selvilla kaikista ulkomaisille tai paikallisills joukkotiedotusvälineitten edustaiille annettavista haastatteluista, kuvauksista, filmauksista, lausun noista yms. alaan kuuluvasta. Tämä koskee erikoisesti välikohtauksia ja vahingoittumisia koskevia ilmoituksia, joilla useinkin saattaa olla poliittista merkitysta. Kuitenkin tiedotusupseerin tehtävät keskittyvat pääasiassaa) joukko-osaston sisäisen tiedotustoiminnan, b) kotimaan joukkotiedotusvälineitä palvelevan ja c) tiedotusaineiston jakeluun, arkistointiin, yms. seikkoihin liittyvän toiminnan hoitamiseen.

a.) Joukko-osastoon kohdistuva eli sisäinen tiedotustoiminta tapahtuu tavallisesti kiertokirjeita, uutisja tiedotuslehtisia tai ääniradion suomia kanavia hyväksi-käyttaen. Tiedotustoiminnan tulee sisältää esim. uutis- (paikallis-, koti- ja ulkomaan), loma-, koulutus-, viihde-, valistus-, urheilu-, komppania-, henkilö- yms. luontoisia asioita. Huomattakoon, ettá pataljoonan tiedotusupseeri toimii tässä suhteessa vain organisoivana, valvovana ja kokoavana henkilona, kun taas ideointi, toteutus ja aineistonkeruu tapahtuu tavallisesti komppanioissa toimivien yhteyshenkilöitten ka-

b.) Kotimaahan suuntautuva tiedotustoiminta tapahtuu miletei yksinomaisesti pataljoonan tiedotu-

luonteeltaan palvelevaa, luovaa ja tuottavaa (opastus, haastattelut. artikkelit, kuvaukset, nauhotukset jne.) Tiedotusupseerin tulee kannustaa pataljoonan kuuluvia omakohtaisesti toimittamaan aineistoa kotimaan lehdistöä tai muita tiedotusvalineita varten. Hänen on kuitenkin henkilökohtaisesti tarkastettava k.o. tuotteet ennen niiden kotimaahan toimittamista.

c.) Paitsi joukko-osaston tiedotustoiminnan organisointiin, ohjaukseen ja toteutukseen liittyviä seikkoja, tiedotusupseerin on val vottava, että kaikki teksti-, kuva-, filmi, ääninauha yms. aineisto tulee asiallisesti jaetuksi ja arkistoiduksi. Sama koskee myös veljesjoukkoosastoilta saatavaa tiedotusmateriaalia. Tälta pohjalta lähtien hänen tulee myös suorittaa vertailuja ia tehdä rakentavia ehdotuksia toiminnassa ilmenneiden puutteiden korvaamiseksi Eri kontingenteissa suoritetta

vassa sisäisessä ja ulkoisessa tiedotustoiminnassa näyttää esiintyvän huomattavaia organisatorisia ja toiminnallisia eroja. Jonkinlaisena keskivertona voidaan kuitenkin pitää sellaista, jossa päällikönä toimii majurin arvoinen lehdistöupseeri. "A" Squadron the 14/20th King's Hussars assumed United Nations responsibility at Zyyi at 1200 hours on Wed-

The Squadron commanded by Major Robin Harris, will serve for up to six months with UNFICYP and will be under command of the 1st Battalion Grenadier Guards.

FORMATION OF THE REGIMENT

The 14th Light Dragoons were raised in July 1715 by Brigadier General James Dormer. The 20th Light Dragoons were raised in 1759 during the Seven Years War against the Austrians, Russians and French. Both Regiments amalgamated in 1922 at the Cavalry Barracks, Cologne the 14th having become the 14th King's Hussars in 1861 and the 20th the 20th Hussars in 1863. In 1922 the amalgamated Regiment was known as the 14/20th Hussars and in 1936 became known as the 14/20th King's Hussars. 'A' Squadron was formed for the 20th Hussars.

SOME HISTORICAL HIGHLIGHTS

The 14th Light Dragroons were first in action on the 12th November 1715 when they attacked a Jacobite force the Battle of Preston. When the rebels surrendered the 14th escorted the prisoners to Lancaster goal. The man recruting area of the Regiment today is in Lan-

After Preston the 14th served for many years in Ireland. In 1794 some elements of the Regiment fought against the French Revolutionary Armies in Holland and in 1795 the Regiment was in action in San Domingo.

During the Penninsular War, where the Regiment was in high favour with the Duke of Wellington they gained one

of their treasured souvenirs. In the rout after the Battle of Vittoria on 21 June 1813, the 14th pursued the French and struck at their rearguard capturing a tumbril.

In the tumbril was the personal baggage of Napoleon's brother, King Joseph of Naples. Among it was Joseph's silver chamber pot complete with the engraved crest of the Napoleon family.


This pot known as "The Emperor" is filled with champagne and passed round the Officers Mess on Guest Nights. By tradition the last drink, usually the most junior member, places the pot on his head when it is

During the Sikh wars in 1858, Lt Leith won the Victoria Cross — the first to be gained by the Regiment.





Queen's Own Rifles Observe 105th Birthday - It's History

ONDAY, 26 April 1965, was the 105th Birthday of the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada.

In 1859 the government of the British provinces of Canada

proposed a widespread militia reorganization to meet increasing

threats from the United States.

One move of this reorganization came on 26 April 1860 when six independent militia companies in Toronto, Barrie, and Whitby, Ontario were grouped together to form the "2nd Battalion, Volunteer Militia Rifles of Canada." The 1st Battalion had been formed some months previous in Montreal.

Within three years this battalion was renamed the "2nd Battalion, The Queen's Own Rifles of Toronto." Later in 1882 this militia force became the "2nd Battalion, Queen's Own Rifles of Subsequent name Canada. changes established the unit as a regiment with the title "The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada."

Since the 1860's the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada has seen action in every compaign that Canadian forces have been engaged — The Fenian Raids, The North West Rebellion of 1885, The Boer War, the two World Wars and Korea.

It was only in 1953 however that the Queen's Own Rifles of Canada became a unit of the Canadian Regular Army. In this

year the 1st and 2nd battalions "Canadian Rifles," ad hoc battalions formed from various militia units for NATO service, became the 1st and 2nd Battalions The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada. The original milia unit then became the 3rd Battalion.

Today in 1965 the regiment includes two Regular Army Battalions one militia Battalion and a recruit training depot all of whom remember the 2nd Volunteer Militia Rifles of the 1860's by the figure "2" surmounting the maple leaf of the Regimental badae.

In Cyprus the 1st Battalion remembered their founding in many ways. The rifle companies wherever possible undertook barbecues or special dinners for the NCO's and men not immediately involved in peace keeping duties.

The officers and Senior NCO's of the Battalion both held barbecues at Templestowe high above Kyrenia. Both functions were reported to be successes with guests invited from amongst the local re-

ations in Cyprus in the establishment of which Canada had played an important part.

These operations, the Foreign Minister said, had been successful and anyone who doubted this might ask himself what could have happened had there been no UN-FICYP. He made reference to a speech he had made earlier in the day to some Canadian soldiers in the Kyrenia hills in which he said UNFICYP was a part in the process of establishing what would ultimately be the way in which nations would settle their differences, not by intervention on the part of individual nations but by United Nations intervention. This was a noble undertaking and Canada was glad to be able to support it.

Mr. Martin said his conversations with the Foreign Minister of Cyprus, Mr. Spyros Kyprianou, had been useful but he added that Canada could not express any political views on substantial issues. He said that mediation was the concern of the United Nations; nevertheless, he said, "I hope that the day is not distant when peace will come to this island". He concluded with expressions of warm friendship and peace to Cyprus.

Security Council Session To Widen Rhodesian Rule "Live" on European T.V.

For the first time, proceedings of the Security Council were transmitted "live" last week on 3 May as a news event to Europe by United Nations Television via a communications satellite.

From 4:40 to 5:05 p.m. (EDT), United Nations Television broadcast "live" to Europe via the Early Bird comunications satellite porti-ons of the Security Council discussion on the situation in the Dominican Republic, a question brought before the Council by the USSR. The transmission carried "live" portions of the statements of Adlai E. Stevenson of the United States and Fernando Alvarez Tabio of Cuba, and by telefilm recording, of Nikolai T. Fedorenko of the USSR, who spoke before the transmission started.

In earlier instances, the ceremonial opening of the seventeenth and eighteenth General Assembly sessions were transmitted via Telstar, Relay and Syncom.

Last week's broadcast of the Security Council proceedings was originated by the United Nations at the request of the EBU (European Union) and the OIRT (International Radio and Television Organization). It was transmitted "live" as a news event to the following members of the EBU: Belgium, Denmark, Finland, Federal Republic of Germany, the Netherlands, Norway and Sweden; as well as to the following members of the OIRT: Czechoslovakia, German Democratic Republic and Poland. Earlier the same day, from 10 to 10:30 a(m. (EDT), Unit-Nations Television originated the first point-topoint transimssion from North America to Europe over the Early Bird communications satellite. This half-hour transmission carried news broadcasts by four correspondents accredited to the United Nations, coming from Italy, Finland, Norway and Sweden, and their interviews with the re-presentatives of Italy, Finland and Norway. The broadcast also carried several musical selections performed by the United Nations Singers, who will shortly be proceeding on a concert tour in Europe and visiting several of the countries which received today's United Nations transmission.

UN Urges British Action

Great Britain to take all necessary action to prevent a unilateral declaration of independence by the minority Government in Southern Rhodesia.

The request was made on the eve of the elections which African nations feared would be a prelude to a move to entrench minority rule in Africa.

Council's action on Southern Rhodesia came in the adoption of a resolution submitted by the Ivory Coast, Jordan and Malaysia. The resolution asked Great Britain not to transfer any of the powers of sovereignty to the colony as present governed but to promote the attain-ment of independence on the basis of a majority rule.

Britain was asked to consult all concerned with the view to calling a conference of all the political parties to draw up a new constitution acceptable to the majority, so that the earliest date might be set for independence.

nization of American States' resolution setting up an Inter-American force to send to the Dominican Republic figured

prominently.

PRO AND CON

The first speaker during this session was Ambassador De Beus of the Netherlands. He said the issue should be handled primarily by the Organization of American States.

The Netherlands Delegate said that the United Nations Charter specified that in case of a dispute, Members should first of all seek a solution by means such as that of regional organizations, and that the Security Council should encourage this procedure.

Mr. Arsene Usher of the Ivory Coast said his country opposed the overthrow of a lawful Government by unlawful means, and that no Government should dispatch armed or un-armed units to another country without a request from that country; this applied, he said, both to armed forces and to subversive

agents.

Mr Usher said the Council should seek the withdrawal of U.S. troops along with the freezing of the situation and a restoration of normal conditions. As a practical matter, he said, this could not be done without the cooperation of the O.A.S., which had proved itself in the past.

The Dominican issue was taken up by the Security Co-uncil at the instance of the Soviet Union.

Ambassador Nikolai Fedorenko earlier last week said that the U.S. initally used a

saving American lives to launch what had become a fullscale invasion of the Dominican Republic with frankly imperialist designs. He said the U.S. had invoked the usual false charges of communism to justify the military occupation and it was using the Organization of American States as a screen for its illegal intervention in the internal affairs of the small Latin American State.

The Soviet call for a Council condemnation of the U.S. action and demand for withdrawal of U.S. troops was supported by Mr. Fernando Alvarez Tabio of Cuba, who asked to participate in the Council's debate as a non-member. Once again, he declared, Iatin American soil was being trampled by the "Yankee boot" and Latin lives were being "cut down" in order to secure a Government obedient to orders Washington.

O.A.S. ACTION

Mr. Adlai Stevenson of the United States said that the recent uprising in the Dominican Republic was initially of a broad democratic inspiration, but armed communists rapidly moved to a position of decisive influence as part of a deliberate effort of Havana and Moscow to promote subversion and create unrest in the Caribean. He assured the Council that the U.S. had no intention of seeking to dictate the political future of the Dominican Republic, and that it would continue to work with the O.A.S. in assisting in the return of a constitutional Go-

Pointing to the O.A.S. decision to send an inter-American force to the Dominican Republic to help restore peace and normal conditions, Mr. Stevenson asked the Council to keep the issue under review until the O.A.S. had completed its work and the people of the Dominican Republic have been able to exercise their own poli-

Mr. Garlos Maria Velazques of Uruguay declared that the United States had engaged in an arbitrary unilateral action which contravened to inter-American non - intervention agreements. The Johnson doctrine, he said, ran against the right of self-determination and was entirely foreign to the inter-American system, which prohibited any kind of intervention in the internal affairs of a State.

Mr. Fernando Ortiz Sanz of Bolivia said the first requirement was to restore an atmosphere in which truth could be discerned and self-determination applied.

Mr. Roger Seydoux of France said it would appear that the large-scale intervention was taking place without an evident justification and in favor of a faction opposed to those laying claim to constitutional legitinacy.

Lord Caradon of the United Kingdom said the Council could best serve the cause of peace in the Dominican Republic by supporting O.A.S. moves looking forward to a free choice by the Dominican Republic.
