UNANIMOUS SECURITY COUNCIL DECISION

THREE MORE MONTHS

T THE MEETING OF THE SECURITY COUNCIL A ON SATURDAY MORNING, 20 JUNE 1964, THE RE-SOLUTION RECOMMENDING AN EXTENSION OF THREE MORE MONTHS TO THE MANDATE OF UN-FICYP WAS ADOPTED UNANIMOUSLY.

During the debate representatives of the countries concerned in the Cyprus question put forward their own governments' view.

THE DEBATE

Ambassador Orhan Eralp of Turkey drew a picture of continuing attacks on Turkish Cypriots by Greek Cypriots and said that Turkey truly desired independence for Cyprus, whereas the Greek Cypriots wanted union with Greece.

Spyros Kyprianou. Cyprus' foreign minister, said the danger was the threat of Turkish invasion. His government, he said, was prepared to guarantee the human rights of everybody in Cyprus but was not willing to negotiate the right of the majority to rule.

The representative of Greece said that the crisis was created entirely by the leaders of the Turkish community in Cyprus and by the government of Turkey.

All members however praised particularly the efforts which were being made by the Secretary - General, U Thant, and his mediator in Cyprus, Ambassador Tuomioja, towards the solution of the Cyprus problem.



THE SECURITY COUNCIL

Noting that the report by the Secretary-General considers the maintenance in Cyprus of the United Nations Peace-keeping Force, created by the Security Council resolution of 4 March 64, for an additional period of three months to be useful and advisable.

tion to the Secretary-General for his efforts in the implementation of the Security Council resolution of 4 March 64, and 13 March 64,

Expressing its deep appreciation to the states that have contributed troops, police, supplies and financial support for the implementation of the Security Council the 4 March 64, Council resolution of

- 1. Reaffirms its resolutions of 4 March 64 and 13 March 64.
- 2. Calls upon all members states to comply with the above-mentioned resolution.
- 3. Takes note of the report by

the Secretary-General.

4. Extends the stationing in Cyprus of the United Nations Peace-keeping Force established under the resolution of 4 March 64 by an additional period of three months, ending 26 September 1964.

SAME STRENGTH AND TERMS

Cabling the news to the Permanent Missions to the United Nations of Australia, Austria, Canada, Denmark, Finland, Ireland, New Zea-Finland, Ireland, land, Sweden and the United

Kingdom, the Secretary-General has asked them to submit urgently to their govern-ments his formal request that their government's contingent with the Force be extended through 26 September 1964, at the same strength and on the same terms as at present.

FINANCE

The Secretary - General has also appealed for voluntary contributions for financing of UNFICYP. In his report of 15 June it is estima-(Continued on Page Two Column 4)

The Secretary - General has sent the following cable to General Kodendera Subayya Thimayya of India, former Chief of the Army Staff of the Indian Army

UNFICYP'S

OWN POOL

It all began when HQ UN-FICYP Staff suddenly realised that there was going to be a problem in the hot months if there was no place locally where everyone could go and have a swim.

It was suggested that, as the RAF Nicosia Swimming Pool was not available to UN-FICYP, a pool should be built conveniently near by. The idea was approved and after looking around the area an old static water tank was found at RAF Nicosia. This had then to be converted into a fully fledged swimming pool - no mean task.

However Lt Philip Biscombe Royal Engineers, and a small detachment tackled the many problems, chief among them being the provision of a filteration unit, a chlorination plant, a plumbing circuit and a project to provide waterproofing for a balance tank were helped by Mr. Smith, an engineer from RAF Nicosia, Mr. Yates of WRD and men of the Royal Signals, Black Watch and Rifle Brigade.

For two months the team worked hard and finally on the 30th May the pool was ready for use. The first one in was Lt Biscombe (some say aided in by a helping elbow while he maintains he slipped) and soon after the army construction team had joined him in the water to enjoy the fruits

of their hard work. Now the pool is going strong with frequent transport runs from HQ UNFICYP.

The Security Council has approved an extension of the United Nations Force in Cyprus for a second period of three months commencing 27 June 1964. It therefore gives me great pleasure to appoint you as Commander - designate of UNFICYP. The date when you arrive in Cyprus will determine when you will assume active command. General Gyani cannot remain beyond the end of this month and therefore hope you can be available quickly. I would wish you to come to New York as soon as possible for briefing and consultations for a day or two before you proceed to Cyprus."

ted that the additional costs will approximate to 7,300,000 dollars. The increased amount is due primarily to the anticipated claims of certain governments providing contingents to the Force for what are described as "onetime costs" in respect of equipment and supplies taken to Cyprus and also to the fact that not all units were in Cyprus for the full period of the first three months

As the new resolution extends the Force as established by that of 4 March it is expected that payment for the Force will be made in the same way as for the first three months.

The resolution of 4 March had recommended that all costs pertaining to the Force be met by the governments providing the contingents and by the government of Cyprus and also authorized the Secretary - General to accept voluntary contributions.

The Secretary - General has asked the governments to contribute as promptly and as generously as possible

SOUTH AFRICA

The question of Apartheid was again the subject of much discussion in the Security Council.

On 15 June the Council urgently reiterated its appeal to the government of South Africa to liberate all persons imprisoned, interned or subjected to other restrictions for having opposed the policies of Apartheid.

CAMBODIA & VIET-NAM

The mission to Cambodia and the republic of Viet-Nam left on 21 June. At its first meeting, prior to leaving, the mission elected Dey Outlid Sidi Baba of Morocco as Chairman. The other mermbers of the mission are n noel Pio Correa jr. of Bra zil and Moise Aka of the Iv ory Coast

WHAT TO BUY

Those who will soon be leaving Cyprus will be thinking of what to take with them for presents and souvenirs.

Handicrafts which are typical of Cyprus are headed by 'Lefkaritika" the famous lace which comes from Lefkara. There are many other patterns and embroidered cloths too and reasonably cheap if one goes to the right place. One has to shop very carefully and compare prices (it has been known for an item in one shop to cost twice as much in another).

Sheepskin rugs are extremely cheap and sheepskin coats can be made to measure.

There are small pottery and wood carving concerns whose work is representative of Cyprus themes.

Of course one must not forget the wine of Cyprus and there is a large selection to choose from — Commandaria being the most well-known.

FIN BN INCIDENT

Several reports have been received of an incident at Kykko camp at 23.45 hrs on the night of 19 June. About 25 rifle shots were heard in that area and these were followed by a large explosion.

KATACLYSMOS

NO CELEBRATION THIS YEAR

The feast of Kataclysmos follows 50 days after the Greek Orthodox Easter but this year, on account of the situation on the island, there will not be the usual festival.

In peaceful times Larnaca is the scene of the best celebrations and here the people dress up in their native costumes and dance and sing by the seashore. The youth who dances the best has the chance of gaining a rich and beautiful girl from any village!

There is also a poetry competition in which contenders speak in verse by turn, the younger poets dwelling on romantic themes whilst the older are more humorous and satirical.

According to the church, Kataclysmos — equivalent to whitsuntide - refers to the Great Flood in the Bible. But it is also closely tied up with the pagan worship of Cyprus' goddess of love, Aphrodite.

The festival lasts for three days and three nights and ends with many young men finding their own goddess of love.

HEY TAXI!

Taxis in Cyprus are easily recognisable by a yellow stripe along the side of the car. Prices of taxis have been fixed and in Nicosia, for example, for any trip which takes you from and to either a place in the walled city or its environs. the charge should not be more than 200 mils and for a journev to the suburbs the charge will be about 250 mils. These prices are for the hire of the taxi and not for each person who travels in it.

Trips from Nicosia to other towns on the island can also be made in a hire cab and prices of these are quite reasonable. A journey to Larnaca would cost 250 mils and to Paphos 500 mils per seat.

Self-drive cars can be hired either on a daily basis from 2,000 mils to 3,000 mils (£2 to £3) or on a long-term basis with a discount. Third party insurance is enforced by law
