at final meeting

The United Nations General Assembly wound up its XX regular annual meeting last week amid expessions of pleasure at what it had done, but also of grave concern about the war or the proverty gripping many parts of the world.

In bringing the three-month session to a close in the early hours of Wednesday morning, 22 December, the Assembly President, Foreign Minister Amintore Fanfani of Italy, said that the 117-nation body had carried on its work between a sigh of relief over the September truce achieved between India and Pakistan, and expressions of anxiety over the fighting in Viet-Nam which still continued. The issue was also raised sharply by the U.N. Secretary - General, U Thant, in a New Year message made public in New York in mid-

The war in Viet-Nam, U Thant said, represented the most abhorent and dangerous form of what he spoke of as the dark side of the world. It was more violent and cruel, he declared, than at any other time during the generation of conflict that Viet-Nam had known, and more harmful to the relations among the great Powers and more perilous to the world.

The Secretary-General de-clared that "this war must be stopped" and he urged: "In its place let there be, in the words of the recent appeal by Pope Paul VI, an immediate truce to be followed by reflection, negotiation and finally, peace."

Among the Assembly's accomplishments mentioned by President Fanfani and the Secretary-General were the steps taken towards a world disarmant conference, as well as towards negotiations to stop the spread of nuclear weapons, a resolution against foreign intervention, a Convention against racial discrimination, various decolonization measures, and additional steps in the war against poverty.

A major decision of the Assembly's last, crowded day of work, was the approval without a negative vote of an international Convention seeking to eliminate all forms of racial

GENERAL THIMAYYA IS LAID TO REST

Full military honours

The remains of General K.S. Thimayya were laid to final rest in his home town of Bangalore on Monday afternoon, 20 December.

Full military honours were ac-corded the body when it arrived at Bangalore from Bombay by a special Indian Air Force plane.

Awaiting to receive his body in Bangalore were Mrs. Thimayya, her daughter, Mi-Thimayya, reille, and top representatives of the Indian armed forces. The cortege then slowly proceeded from the airport to the Thimayya residence through streets lined by silent sympathisers. Immediately behind the coffin, an Indian Army offic-er carried the de-

ad General's blue U.N. beret and decorations. his Also in the cortege marched Colonel Jatar, com-mander of the Indian Contingent with the United Nations peace-keeping force in the Middle East, and Captain Fateh Singh, General Thimayya's ADC who escorted the body from Cyprus.

After lying in state in the Thimayya home, where a steady stream of mourners filed past to pay their respects, the their respects, the coffin was draped in Indian and U. N. flags and again placed on a gun carriage for the final journey to the cemetery.

Soldiers with reversed arms lined

versed arms lined the funeral route and hundreds of ordinary citizens followed the military escort with slow-stepped cadence of a funeral march played by a military band.

Among

floral tributes was a wreath laid by Mr. Leon-Leonard Berry, Director of the United Nations Information Centre in Delhi, on behalf of the U. N. Secretary-General, U Thant, whom he represented at the funeral. No speeches were made but a 17-gun salute boomed and volleys were fired in salute as the coffin was lowered into the grave. Army buglers then sounded "Last Post" and General K.S. Thimayya, "a great soldier of peace," was laid to rest in his native land.



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HERALDRY IN CYPRUS

Venetian Quartering

he Tripiotis Church in Solon Street is one of the principal Orthodox Churches of Nicosia. It was built in 1690. The most curious feature of the Church is the number of fragments from older buildings built into its walls and especially noticeable in the three doorways.

The panel forming the lintel above the southern door is most remarkable and certainly of great age, but with the exception of two rather friendly lions, which may or may not be heraldic (they are not in shields), this panel is of no heraldic interest.

The west entrance has a lintel of a block of marble carved in the French style of the 14th century. This fragment would seem to have come from an altar tomb, unfortunately it displays no heraldry. Above this lintel an oval shield is inserted on the wall. The shield is quarterly, 1, a fleur-de-lis; 2. a lions head; 3. a cross on a "six-mount"; 4. a wing.

Quartering is the marchalling of two or more coats of arms on one shield by dividing the shield into four and placing a coat of arms into each division. If two coats only are to be quartered the more important is placed in 1 and 4, the other in 2 and 3.

Although all four charges in this coat of arms are different it eventually only is a quartering of two coats of arms. A tombstone from a church near Nicosia bear the arms of a fleur-de-lis above a wing possibly for the Venetian Family Canali and in a church in Venice we find the "six-mount" with the cross besides a lion's head as the arms of an Arch-

bishop of the family Podoca-

Thus the coat of arms represents an alliance between the Canali (?) and the Podocataro families where the first would be the father's arms and the second would be the mother's arms.

The idea of spreading the charges over all four quarters is unusual but very suitable in this case where each coat of arms consists of two charges.

In a previous article I made

the statement that the shape of a shield is of little importance from a heraldic point of view. This shield may, however, be an exception from the rule. The oval shape indicates that it could be the arms of a

The third, or north, entrance is covered by a marble lintel of Renaissance design, with a coat of arms in the centre. The shield is quarterly, 1 and 4, the Podocataro arms; 2 and 3, bendy of six, for a family I have not been able to identify. This coat of arms was also once over a door of a house near the old Archbishopric, but when the new Archbishop's Palace was built this house was pulled down. The lintel bearing the arms is now laying in a little garden opposite the Paphos Gate Police Sta-

An early 16th century coat of arms which is inserted on the wall outside the Roman Catholic Church show a lion's head resembling that of the Podocataro coat of arms, however, lion heads are very common charges and it is very unlikely that there could be any connection.



In a letter, dated 17 December, received by U Thant, the Deputy Permanent Representative of Norway to the United Nations, Mr. Leif Edwardsen, states that the Norwegian Government, taking note of the Secretary-General's information to the Security Council that UNFICYP cannot be maintained in Cyprus without the financial means to defray its costs, has decided to make a voluntary contribution of Norwegian Kroner 100,000 (approximately \$14,000) towards covering the deficit.

discrimination. Governments signing it will formally commit themselves to prohibit racial discrimination by any person or group, to seek an end to barriers between races, and to take special protective measures for groups that have suffered from discrimination.

Also on the last day, the Assembly called for a wide range of sanctions against Portugal because of her refusal to heed U.N. requests that she allow Angola, Mozambique, and other African territories their independence. Among the sanctions urged were a break in diplomatic relations and a general trade embargo.

Other measures taken by the Assembly during its closing

days were:

* Money needed by the United Nations Middle East Force for 1965 and 1966 was appropriated — 19 million dollars and 15 million dollars, respectively. The vast bulk of these costs were apportioned to 23 economically developed countries, according to a new formula to serve pending an agreement on the controversial problem of peace-keeping operations and their financing.

* The Assembly also approved a budget of 121.5 million dollars for regular U.N. operations next year.

* On the issue of non-inter-

The Assembly asked all countries to respect the sovereignty, unity, independence and territorial in-tegrity of Cyprus, and to avoid any intervention against it. The vote was 47 in favour, 5 against, and 54 abstentions. Turkey opposed the resolution on the grounds that it was weighted in favour of the views of Cyprus and the Greek Government and did not give proper recognition of the rights of the Turkish Cypriot minority.

vention in the domestic affairs of States, the Assembly approved a compromise resolution embodying the concepts put forward by the Soviet Union, the United States, and Latin American and African nations. It spoke out against armed intervention and other direct or indirect forms of interference including subversion and intervention in civil strife.

* The Assembly reaffirmed the long-standing U.N. objectives in Korea and called for further efforts to unify the country by peaceful means. It asked North Korean authorities to accept U.N. objectives for a unified, independent and de-

mocratic Korea.

- * Another resolution called on all European States to intensify efforts for better relations and thus facilitate a reduction in tension in Europe and throughout the world.
- * On outer space, the Assembly asked a United Nations committee dealing with this to continue to work on international agreements covering aid to astronauts in difficulty and liability for damage.

Other decisions covered a wide range of economic matters:

- * The Assembly urged that more capital aid be provided to developing countries from both Government and private sources. It set the target of \$200 million annual for United Nations aid. It decided to establish a special U.N. organization to promote industrial development.
- * The Assembly also expressed concern at the lack of progress in solving the difficult position of poorer countries seeking to get adequate prices for their exports or raw materials and basic agricultural products. Yet another re solution, asked that the World Food Programme be continued for as long as needed, and set a target of \$275 million for the 1966 to 1968 period.

some extent, continue nevertheless without interruption to carry out and indeed to expand many of those functions which its Member States and the peoples of the world in general have come to regard as indispensable. I refer in particular to our peace-keeping operations, in which we both maintained our existing responsibilities in varous parts of the world and undertook new ones in the Caribbean and along the line of conflict between India and Pakistan; to our work in economic and social development, where we continued to expand our well established technical co-operation activities and made sound progress in the establishment of the institutions necessary to our new tasks in the field of trade and development; and to our slow and painstaking search for the basis for further progress towards disarmament. We have seen the Security Council respond promptly and positively to the need for international action to contain some of the dangers arising in some of the trouble spots which still cause us anxiety. And in the last quarter of the year we have seen the General Assembly, fully restored to normality, taking new decisions on such matters as disarmament, the prevention of nuclear proliferation and closer economic co-operation, with a vigour which should encourage us to believe that the Organization is capable of growing stronger in the face of adversi-

In the same context I may also recall the unforgettable visit to Headquarters by Pope Paul VI, and his addresses to the General Assembly and to the staff, as an event which marked, reflected and indeed perhaps stimulated a turn of the tide. There can be few who failed to find inspiration, encouragement and even reward in his moving and intensely human expression of those aspirations of mankind which are formally enunciated in the Charter itself.

Little by little, we are making headway against the scourge of war and the tyranny of poverty. Little by little the world is becoming saner and safer. Modest though the contribution of each of us must be, we can rejoice at the opportunity of sharing the task. I thank each and every one of you, both in Headquarters and in far distant corners of the world, for what you have given to it during this past year. And to each and every one of you, I wish a well-deserved holiday and a rewarding New Year.
